MID TERM REPORT CARD

The 1985 interim rating of the Colorado Legislature, as always, is based on the bills described in this publication. These bills were selected by the board of directors and executive committee of C.U.T. for being distinct taxpayer issues.

Unlike previous ratings, we have not let legislators off the hook for being absent from recorded votes. Our feeling is that legislators are paid by the taxpayers to serve in the Legislature. If they do not vote, for whatever reason, they are not performing their mission. Thus absences and wrong votes carry the same weight.

There were several pro taxpayer bills that

were considered for use in the rating which were shelved because of amendments that offset the benefits. i.e. "Padding". One of the best examples of this was S.B. 82.

This bill prohibits payment of disability benefits to covered members of the state Firefighters and Police pension plan who are disabled by drug abuse, self inflicted injury, or while committing a felony. This is good.

However, it also makes members on leave of absence eligible for those benefits. That's bad!

We wonder why it is so hard for the Legislature to do right by the taxpayer

without doing him in at the same time.

Members of C.U.T. originally considered 175 bills. Our full spending study, which will be the subject of another newsletter, used 88 votes in the Senate and 94 votes in the House.

The unanimous impression of those of us who worked on this study was that special interests and lobbyists have placed their thumbprints on virtually all legislation we reviewed.

Some may say that nobody is watching the henhouse. We disagree. The henhouse is being guarded by the finest group of foxes money can buy.

Thus, the expense allowance increase appears to us as merely a thinly disguised method of gaining extra pay from the taxpayers without being taxed on it. Those of us in the private sector go to jail for similar methods of tax avoidance.

While sounding good on the surface, this bill does not require robbers to compensate their victims. Rather, it sets up a pool whereby minor traffic offenders pay increased fines by 30% to 133%. Compensation even includes mental health counseling - A Pandora's box in itself.

The administration proceedures involved in this bill are a bureaucrat's delight.

The piece de resistance is the repeal of the automatic termination date of the act.

C.U.T. wants felons to compensate their victims. We oppose Government getting this big a slice of the action at the expense of ordinary citizens not guilty of the actual crimes.

Creates the Public Safety Inspection Fund.

These kinds of subsidies have never created lasting benefits for the free enterprise system and invariably act in its detriment.

We note another resolution, H.J.R. 1010 urges Congress to take steps to decrease the federal deficit. We declined to use H.J.R. 1010 in the present rating because of its obvious hypocrisy.

A good example of special interests gaining at the expense of others occured when the Colorado legislature during the 1985 session enacted tax increases of \$70.7 million. A reduction of indexing amounting to a tax increase of \$42.3 million and the elimination of the first \$100,000 exemption for all corporations from a corporate tax resulting in a tax increase of \$17.3 were of the most concern to taxpayers. Early dealing to completely eliminate indexing aroused the dander of C.U.T. as well as others and we assume this taxpayer pressure stopped the legislature from completely dissovling what was probably the most courageous and honest piece of legislation enacted in recent Colorado history. The elimination of the \$100,000 exemption was a significant loss suffered by the vast majority of businesses, particularly small and new businesses.

In summary, C.U.T. does not consider a tax increase of \$70.7 million, justified by shifting taxes of \$5.5 million from special interests (multinationals and newspapers), a good deal for the other 99% of Colorado's taxpayers. Special treatment freeing mul-

tinationals and other special interests from paying taxes results in a tax shift which increases the taxes of all others, unless there is an accompanying budget cut, which of course there was not. C.U.T. understands multinationals do not like government reports and paperwork, particularly involving activities and information outside Colorado. This dislike is shared by many other Colorado taxpayers and businesses. In the final analysis, there is only one way to reduce the growth of size and cost (taxes) of government, and that is to reduce the government's spending of our nation's, or state's, real earnings or wealth. To be sure, those taxes that are necessary should be justly administered in a structure designed with equal treatment of all taxpayers before the law.

SKEWERED TAXPAYER AWARD



Several legislators deserve Skewered Taxpayer awards for the latest ratings period. Worst Democrats at 0 were senators Martinez, Peterson and Sandoval as well as Representative Romero. Republicans most deserving of this distinction are Senators Fenion and Meiklejohn and Representative Hume, each of whom generously managed one pro taxpayer vote among the rated bills.

We particularly commend Representative Erickson for being the most consistent champion of the taxpayer. Sometimes it is a lonely position; especially when a steam roller is gathering speed in his direction.
